1. Ask for questions.
2. Further examination on psychological types.
3. Discussion of popular and sound thinking.
4. Algebraic example of false thinking.
5. Danger involved in the political control of the technological mind.
6. The problem of functional types being true to their own laws.
7. This is not simply a problem of compromise since that rules out the type that must be uncompromisingly true to principle.
8. Idea that each function opens up a unique dimension of consciousness.
9. There must be complete freedom of development in the direction of the given dimension, without one function imposing its dictum upon the free play of another function.
10. This points toward a society organized on the basis of vertical classification.
11. Exercise in the space-vacuum concentration.
12. Develop idea that inmost reality of every man is a Divine or Spacial Being.
13. This is the immortal part, since bodies and not space is subject to the law of becoming.
14. Embodied consciousness then is viewed as a projected and inferior part of the individual consciousness.
15. The union of the essence of the embodied and the spacial consciousness is equivalent to the union of the active and passive principle of consciousness.
16. Passive consciousness is the Primordial Consciousness.
17. Active consciousness is self-consciousness, or the polarized consciousness which is conscious of itself.
18. Once the union is achieved there arises the opportunity to develop the power to project embodied consciousness at will.
